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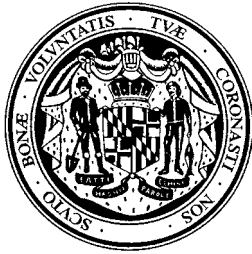

MIKE ROGERS:

Acting President and General Manager

Mike Rogers took over as acting President and General Manager of the Maryland Jockey Club in June 2021. Rogers was named President of The Stronach Group's racing division, one of North America's leading horse racetrack operators and suppliers of pari-mutuel technology, in June 2012.

Rogers started his career in the horse racing industry more than 27 years ago. In the early days, he held various positions including hot walker, groom and jockey's valet. He later became a licensed owner and breeder of Thoroughbreds and in 1996, he became a sports agent representing jockeys in the Canada and the United States.

In 1998, Rogers joined Adena Springs as business manager and since has been actively involved in the Thoroughbred operations of owner and breeder Frank Stronach.

Rogers also commits time to serving on numerous industry boards and committees, including the Breeders' Cup, Equibase, National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA), Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance (TAA), Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association (TOBA), Thoroughbred Racing Associations (TRA), Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau (TRPB), Permanently Disabled Jockeys Fund (PDJF) and Racing Medication and Testing Consortium (RMTC).

Rogers is also a Vice President of the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame and The Jockey Club of Canada.

MARYLAND JOCKEY CLUB HISTORY

It all began in colonial days when men were of a necessity much closer to horses and the improvement of their breed. The first recorded instances of organized racing occur in Virginia, but by 1740 the sport was being fostered in Maryland by Governor Samuel Ogle. To conduct and regulate race meetings, the Maryland Jockey Club was founded in 1743 and thus today is the oldest sporting association in the United States.

There is scant record of the activities of the original MJC, save the notations in George Washington's diary, which would indicate that the meetings served as excuses for rather extensive social affairs. Throughout Washington's diaries runs the theme of his breeding and racing horses. In any event, the club was suspended during the Revolutionary War and was not re-organized until March 12, 1783, when Governor Paca and Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, became its presiding officers. The group included Benjamin C. Stoddert, first secretary of the Navy.

The club continued with-as-catch-can meetings for a number of years until 1830 when the MJC was officially incorporated on June 3 by an instrument of charter, which is today housed in the Library of Congress.

The new club was significant for several reasons. It was the first to lay out a race track to scale (one mile around) and to use precision timing of the events, three clock devices of different natures being utilized for the purpose.

President Andrew Jackson became a MJC member the day before the first meeting was run off on Oct. 25, 1831 at the Central Course, located near Old Frederick Road and Franklin Turnpike, outside of Baltimore. A lifelong horseman, Jackson was a former saddle-maker, who remained a MJC member for many years. Admission, if you came by four-wheel carriage, was \$1 for the carriage and each person it contained. Those coming by two-wheeler or on horseback paid 75 cents and those on foot were charged a quarter.

The scale of weights for the meeting indicated that two-year-old colts and fillies would be assigned "a feather," three-year-olds lugged 86 pounds, and top weight was 124 pounds for seven-year-olds and up. This was merciful on the Thoroughbreds since the emphasis was on stamina rather than speed and four-mile heats were the custom to settle the issue. In case of ties, it was not unusual for horses to run 20 miles before a winner was declared.

Racing got under way for the first time at the present Pimlico on Oct. 25, 1870 with a surprising 12,000 fans present. The feature event was a \$10,000 match race between Stamps and Narragansett, a sizable purse for those times, but even that was topped by the \$15,000 purse for the winner of the Dinner Party Stakes the next day.

The latter event was won by Sanford's Preakness, a strikingly handsome colt which covered the two mile distance in 3:47 1/2 under a capable ride from the noted English jockey, William Hayward. As it turned out, however, the horse far overshadowed the race he won that day. He

was subsequently shipped to England, one of the first American exports of thoroughbreds, and won stakes races there before retiring to stud.

It was natural then, that in 1873, when the immediately successful Pimlico management was in need of a name for a major stakes contest for three-year-olds, Preakness was considered and adopted. Thus was born the middle jewel of American racing's famed Triple Crown.

It had cost about \$25,000 to build the original Pimlico, the chief expense being a high-tiered wooden stand featured by three prominent spires. This stand has long since vanished, along with the original clubhouse, flamboyant in its "gingerbread" Victorian style, and a Pimlico fixture until a destructive fire in 1966.

Later, in 1956, the sleeping quarters were converted into semi-private dining and club rooms for the members and a library was created to house the invaluable collection of books and records of the Maryland Jockey Club. One of the second floor gaming rooms became the Jockeys Hall of Fame.

The success at Pimlico established the MJC as the leading racing body in the East. Its rules and scale of weights were in common use at tracks from Charleston to New York.

Racing was banned in New York in 1911. The economic catastrophe which threatened horsemen as a result, paved the way for the opening of a major track at Laurel. Laurel Racecourse, now conducting business as Laurel Park, became part of the Maryland racing schedule that same year. Another major track was opened at Havre de Grace in 1912 and Maryland became the metropolis of Eastern racing.

Sportsman William P. Riggs set about to establish Pimlico as the nation's premier track. As secretary of M.J.C., he boosted the purse for the Preakness past \$10,000 for the first time in 1918 and the event attracted so many entries it had to be run in two divisions.

Originally, the basement of the old clubhouse contained a bowling alley and the middle floors were given over to ornate gaming rooms, and the famous Hilltop Dining Room. The third floor contained sleeping quarters for MJC members who were present to race their horses.

In 1919, Sir Barton won the Kentucky Derby on May 10, shipped to Pimlico and won the Preakness on May 14, and then copped the Belmont Stakes on June 11, (sandwiching in a victory in the Withers on May 24), to become America's first Triple Crown winner, an honor attained by only 10 other horses since, though nearly every good three-year-old has tried it.

Pimlico quickly advanced to the ranks of the top four racetracks in America in point of purse distribution. This resulted in the attraction of the greatest horses, trainers and jockeys campaigning, including no less than Man O'

War, who skipped the Kentucky Derby to make his three-year-old debut in the Preakness.

By 1937, Pimlico led the nation in purse distribution. Riggs died on February 7, 1926, but he had already assured Pimlico of its present role as Maryland's greatest racing center and one of the nation's most respected tracks, spanning the administration of MJC presidents Robert C. Hall, H. Carroll Brown, William M. Manley and Spalding Lowe Jenkins.

Pimlico maintained its stature under the succeeding administrations of Charles E. McLane, Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt and Henry A. Parr III through 1952, when the track was purchased by business magnates Ben and Herman Cohen in cooperation with their associate, Louis Pondfeld.

By 1954, Pimlico had an entirely new and modern clubhouse and grandstand structure built of steel and concrete and featuring such innovations in sports buildings as escalators and elevators.

In 1957 the Preakness was attended by Vice-President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon. The future President of the United States presented the Woodlawn Vase to Mrs. Carnegie Phipps, whose Bold Ruler defeated Kentucky Derby-winner Iron Leige by two lengths. As the MJC moved into the 60's era, many major improvements were under construction, including a new ultramodern clubhouse, which contained a dining room, jockeys quarters, a new indoor paddock and administrative offices. The finish line was moved 220 yards further down the stretch and the Preakness purse was raised from \$50,000 to \$150,000, making it the richest added money stakes in the United States. In 1966, Kauai King won the Preakness, making him the first Maryland-bred to win since Challedon in 1939. Chick Lang was named the new general manager in 1969 as Preakness Day established Maryland records for wagering and attendance. The \$3,198,502 was the first \$3 million day in MJC history.

The early 1970's saw the remodeling of the grandstand and clubhouse with over \$1.5 million in renovations. The tunnel was installed for Preakness Day for crossing under the top of the stretch. Attendance and wagering records were broken on a yearly basis, and in 1973 Secretariat became the first Triple Crown winner since Citation in 1948. A half-million dollar landscaping around the perimeter of Pimlico was added to the many other improvements. Seattle Slew and Affirmed won back-to-back Preaknesses in 1977 and 1978, en route to becoming the second and third Triple Crown winners of the decade.

In 1983, the MJC purchased Bowie Race Course, the first major racetrack to regularly conduct winter racing in the northeast. The MJC now operates Bowie as a Thoroughbred horse-training center. 1983 also saw Maryland-bred Deputed Testamony, along with local trainer Bill Boniface and Baltimore born jockey Donald Miller, Jr. win the Preakness.

Just before the end of 1986, Frank J. De Francis, along with a group of minority partners, purchased Pimlico from

the Cohen family for more than \$30 million. In the remaining years of the 1980's, several million dollars was spent on innovative facilities improvements at both Laurel and Pimlico. Frank De Francis revived the now-popular Pimlico Special in 1988, after its absence from the stakes program for 29 years. A commanding presence on the local and national racing scene, De Francis spearheaded legislation authorizing Sunday racing in Maryland, telephone wagering and the landmark Tax Reform Act of 1985, which provided tremendous tax relief to the Maryland racing industry.

In August of 1989, De Francis passed away. His son, Joseph A. De Francis, a successful attorney who had worked with his father for several years on Thoroughbred and Standardbred racing issues, became MJC President and Chief Executive Officer at age 34. In 1993, the De Francis family and partner Martin Jacobs purchased the ownership interests of Laurel and Pimlico from several minority partners. In 1993, MJC also celebrated its 250th anniversary, and in 1994, enjoyed the most successful season of racing in the organization's 251-year history.

Under the younger De Francis' stewardship in the 1990's, the MJC realized significant achievements, including: the legislative authorization of unlimited full-card simulcasting and off-track betting; the creation of the first cooperative two state racing circuit between Maryland and Virginia, with the opening of Colonial Downs in 1997; the multi-year legislation of \$36 million in state funding for racing purses and breeders funds, working in cooperation with Maryland horsemen and breeders; and the beginning of the implementation of a five-year, \$60 million plan to move Maryland racing successfully into the 21st century. The last decade of the century saw records established in virtually every statistical wagering category, and on Preakness Day itself, in attendance and handle.

Under the leadership of The Stronach Group, the Maryland Jockey Club has reinvigorated and modernized racing in the Midatlantic in the 21st century. The 141st running of the Preakness Stakes, the Middle Jewel of the Triple Crown, drew a record 135,256 fans who wagered a record \$94,127,434. The 2016 Maryland Million attracted a crowd of 21,722 that wagered \$4.476 million, a 59 percent increase over the 2014 handle.

In recent years, The Stronach Group has committed more than \$30 million to modernize Laurel Park with new suites, boxes, event rooms and new barns. In 2016, it continued expanding its off-track betting network by purchasing Rosecroft, a Standardbred facility in Fort Washington.



THE MARYLAND JOCKEY CLUB *1743 through 2022*

The Maryland Jockey Club was founded more than 30 years before the start of the Revolutionary War. After more than 270 years it remains the corporate name of Pimlico.

A Capsule Chronology

1743 – Maryland Jockey Club founded in Annapolis. The Annapolis Subscription Plate, second oldest known racing trophy in America, won on May 4, 1743, at Annapolis by Dr. George Steuart's Dungannon.

1755 – Irregular meetings from this year until 1764, due to French and Indian War.

1762 – George Washington attended Maryland Jockey Club races frequently, as he did in 1771, 1772, and 1773.

1769 – Both Spring and Autumn meetings held for the first time at Annapolis. From there to the start of the Revolutionary War, the Maryland Jockey Club meetings were the focal point of colonial racing enthusiasts.

1775 – When the Autumn meeting was about to be run, the Maryland Jockey Club races were postponed upon the recommendation of Congress “in consequence of a report upon the state of the country. All quietly returned to their homes.”

1782 – Annapolis races resumed in the autumn, the country having returned to a state of normalcy following the Revolutionary War.

1783 – Maryland Jockey Club revitalized on March 1, six months before the peace treaty, with Governor William Paca and Charles Carroll of Carrollton (both signers of the Declaration of Independence) among the members.

1830 – The Maryland Jockey Club was issued a new charter by Congress which is now in the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. Gen. T. M. Forman elected president; B. I. Cohen, treasurer; and J.S. Skinner, corresponding secretary. With the decline of Annapolis and the growth of Baltimore as an economic center, the Maryland Jockey Club shifted its operations to the Central Course, Baltimore, about five miles southwest of the city on the Frederick Pike.

1831 – President Andrew Jackson became a member of the Maryland Jockey Club, racing his White House stable under the name of his secretary, A.J. Donelson.

1867 – Site of present Pimlico incorporated for a track by the State of Maryland.

1868 – After the interruption caused by the Civil War, a revival began at Saratoga when Maryland Governor Oden Bowie and others devised the Dinner Party Stakes for a track in Baltimore.

1869 – First state fair held at Pimlico.

1870 – Present Maryland Jockey Club site (Pimlico) opened on October 25. New corporation organized May 14 in Barnum's City Hotel in Baltimore. Governor Bowie was elected president of Pimlico. First stakes winner, Preakness, a son of Lexington, won the Dinner Party Stakes on October 27. Also presented were the Supper, Breakfast and Bowie Stakes. Harry Bassett won the Supper Stakes, while Glenelg won both the Breakfast and Bowie Stakes.

1873 – First running of the Preakness, classic event for three-year-olds. There were seven starters from 21 subscribers. Survivor won. The Preakness was named for the first winner of the Dinner Party Stakes.

1875 – John F. Chamberlin's Tom Ochiltree won a maiden race for all ages at six furlongs on May 26 at Pimlico. Two days later he won the third running of the Preakness. Milton H. Sanford's Bay Final, favored on the basis of his victory in a mile race the day previous, finished third.

1876 – The MJC presented nine stakes, which attracted 212 nominations. Shirley won the 4th running of the Preakness.

1877 – House of Representatives adjourned (the Senate had already closed session) on October 24 so that members could witness a race of intersectional scope in which Parole, Ten Broeck and Tom Ochiltree met. They finished in that order. Parole, a Pennsylvania horse, was the upsetter. The MJC's program of ten stakes attracted 274 nominations. Rappahanock ran in match race against Kilburn.

1878 – Duke of Magenta won Preakness, first of five consecutive wins for owner George L. Lorillard.

1881 – Western Maryland branch of Arlington and Pimlico Railroad founded in January to connect Pimlico with the city. The trip from Hillen Station to the track was 25 minutes; round-trip fare, 50 cents. Last state fair held at Pimlico, the event later shifting to Timonium.

1883 – Pimlico Stakes, at 1-5/8 miles on October 26, attracted Iroquois (first American-bred to win the English Derby and first horse to win \$100,000 in purses), and immortal Miss Woodford. The latter, with 109 pounds, won from Dixie winner George Kinney. Iroquois, far below his best form, finished third.

1889 – Maryland Jockey Club racing abandoned at Pimlico until 1904. During this period, several Maryland racing groups held abbreviated meetings at Pimlico, some called “outlaw” affairs, some sanctioned.

1890 – The Preakness was run at Morris Park in New York. For that year only, it was for horses three-year-olds and up.

1894 – Fire destroyed Pimlico grandstand,

September 2. The Preakness was run at Gravesend in Brooklyn, N.Y. where it remained for 15 runnings through 1908.

1898 – On April 26 the First Maryland Brigade went into training at Camp Wilmer, set up in Pimlico infield, less than 48 hours after Spain declared war on the United States. Crowds lined march route from Paca Street to track to watch troops begin training for active duty in Cuba.

1904 – Pimlico property sold to William R. Hammond for \$70,000. Young James E. (Sunny Jim) Fitzsimmons was the leading trainer at the seven-day fall meeting with three winners. William P. Riggs, a New Englander, was the leader in bringing racing back to Pimlico in the autumn of 1904.

1905 – R. Wyndham Walden, one of the greatest American trainers of the 19th century, died April 28, after having saddled record seven Preakness winners, five being in succession (1878-1882).

1908 – New world automobile record for a mile on a circular track established at Pimlico when Italian driver Emmanuele Cedrino sped mile in :51, shaving 5-3/5 seconds off the world standard. Upon completing the mile, Cedrino's racing car went out of control, throwing and fatally injuring its driver.

1909 – The Preakness returned to Pimlico where it has since been run annually without interruption.

1911 – First pari-mutuel windows in Maryland opened at Pimlico's Spring meeting. Havre de Grace followed suit in 1912.

1918 – Preakness run in two divisions, for the only time, as value of race was raised to \$15,000 added from \$5,000 in previous years. Races attracted a total of 26, but five were scratched in each division, with War Cloud winning the first division and Jack Hare, Jr. taking the second.

1919 – Sir Barton, the first Derby winner to run in the Preakness, won here and at the Belmont, to become America's first Triple Crown winner. The J.K.L. Ross owned colt captured the Preakness four days after his Derby victory. Preakness purse was increased to \$25,000.

1920 – Man o' War began his unparalleled three-year-old season with a victory in the Preakness after winter training in Maryland. Burke Law authorized betting in Maryland. Previously, tracks were licensed by Maryland courts.

1921 – Benjamin Block's unbeaten Morvich won the inaugural running of the Pimlico Futurity, then the richest race (\$51,250 gross) in the nation.

1924 – Dixie Handicap revived. Nellie Morse becomes fourth filly to win Preakness.

1926 – William P. Riggs, Maryland Jockey Club secretary who led the revival of the sport at Pimlico in 1904, died after guiding Pimlico to a position of leadership among the nation's racetracks. He returned

the Preakness to Pimlico, revived the Dixie Stakes and originated the Pimlico Futurity, which was the richest race in the nation at its inception. Matthias L. Daiger succeeded Riggs as MJC secretary.

1930 – Gallant Fox, with Earle Sande up, won 55th Preakness and went on to become second Triple Crown winner after an 11 year lapse. On June 8th, after Gallant Fox won the Belmont Stakes, Bryan Field's New York Times story referred to the colt "completing his Triple Crown." It is believed to be one of the earliest references to the Kentucky Derby-Preakness-Belmont Stakes winner.

1933 – American Totalisator installed for Autumn meeting.

1935 – Omaha captured 60th Preakness by six lengths and later became the third Triple Crown winner by taking the Belmont.

1937 – Inaugural running of the Pimlico Special, first race in America by "invitation only" and one of the nation's great weight-for-age classics. Pimlico's average purse distribution nation's highest. War Admiral wins Preakness and becomes the fourth Triple Crown champion and later returns to capture the first Pimlico Special.

1938 – The largest crowd (estimated at 43,000) to see a race at Pimlico turned out on November 1 for the match in which Seabiscuit beat War Admiral in the second running of the Pimlico Special. Hill in infield, which long identified Pimlico as "Old Hilltop," leveled. Alfred G. Vanderbilt, who, over a period of two years secured control of the stock, elected president of Maryland Jockey Club, succeeding Charles E. McLane.

1939 – Maryland-bred Challedon wins Preakness.

1941 – Whirlaway easily won 66th Preakness and later became fifth Triple Crown winner.

1942 – Harry A. Parr elected MJC president when Alfred Vanderbilt entered Navy.

1943 – Count Fleet won 68th Preakness by eight lengths in four-horse field, the smallest since 1908. He became sixth Triple Crown winner. Pimlico ran five-day National War Fund meeting and contributed \$267,142 from autumn meeting receipts to various war charities.

1944 – All Maryland racing conducted at Pimlico due to World War II travel restrictions. Ashes of musician Percy L. Barry spread over racing strip at Pimlico.

1945 – An outstanding one-day stakes program was staged at Pimlico on June 16 with the running of the Preakness, Dixie Handicap, Pimlico Oaks, Jennings Handicap and the Pimlico Nursery. Wartime conditions necessitated the one day meeting.

1946 – Assault won 71st Preakness by neck over Lord Boswell, then took Belmont Stakes to become seventh Triple Crown winner.

1947 – MJC purchased 85-acre tract embracing Pimlico from the Hammond estate for "about

\$1,300,000.” First live telecast (WMAR-TV) in Baltimore history originated at Pimlico at 3 P.M., October 30.

1948 – CBS Network televised the Preakness to Baltimore, Washington, and Philadelphia areas, the first such telecast. Citation won Preakness and became the eighth Triple Crown winner.

1949 – Capot, Preakness winner, beats Coaltown in Pimlico Special. Ashes of Dillon Grey, a trainer who asked to be buried at the races, interred in Pimlico infield.

1950 – Ashes of jockey Willie Doyle, 1909 Preakness winner, scattered over finish line. Control of Laurel sold to Morris Schapiro.

1951 – First race to be televised nationally was the Pimlico Special by CBS from Pimlico November 16.

1953 – Pimlico opened under the management of Ben and Herman Cohen, who had purchased the track the previous year for \$2.2 million. Native Dancer won the Preakness after unlucky loss in the Kentucky Derby.

1954 – New multi-million dollar grandstand opened at Pimlico.

1955 – National Jockeys Hall of Fame founded at Pimlico. Eddie Arcaro, Earl Sande and George Woolf enshrined by votes of more than 1,000 sportswriters.

1957 – Vice President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon attended Preakness and presented Woodlawn Vase to winning owner, Mrs. Henry Carnegie Phipps, whose Bold Ruler defeated Kentucky Derby winner Iron Liege by two lengths.

1958 – A bill for closing Pimlico and transferring the dates to Laurel was defeated by a 15-14 vote in the Maryland legislature.

1959 – Improvement of grandstand-clubhouse building begun. Finish line relocated 220 feet farther down homestretch. Preakness purse increased \$50,000 to \$150,000, making the classic the richest added-money stakes in the United States.

1960 – Ultramodern clubhouse completed in 176-day interval between Pimlico’s spring and autumn meetings. The new building contains dining room, theater-type seats, indoor paddock, jockeys’ quarters and administrative offices.

1962 – New, all weather racing surface installed, the result of 18-month study by Pimlico’s engineers to provide a uniform and safe footing. New aluminum safety rail installed.

1964 – President Lyndon B. Johnson presented honorary lifetime membership in Maryland Jockey Club. Sadair established a world record for earnings by a two-year-old (\$498,216) in winning the Pimlico Futurity.

1965 – Nathan L. Cohen, son of Herman Cohen, appointed vice president of Pimlico and Barclay C. Odell named general manager following resignation on September 1 of vice president Lou Pondfield.

1966 – Fire on night of June 16 destroyed Pimlico’s

Victorian-styled Members’ Clubhouse built in 1870, reducing racing’s oldest edifice to ashes. It also housed National Jockeys Hall of Fame. For first time since 1904, Pimlico did not race in fall, necessitating transfer of Pimlico Futurity to Laurel and return of Dixie Handicap to spring schedule. Kauai King was first Maryland-bred to win Preakness since Challedon in 1939.

1967 – New dining terrace installed at Pimlico, called the Preakness Room, to provide the setting for National Jockeys Hall of Fame. First two all-masonry barns completed in backstretch. Preakness winner Damascus made his season’s debut at Pimlico on March 11 and earned a record \$817,941 for the year, while being named Horse of the Year.

1968 – Old barns on track’s Pimlico Road-Belvedere Avenue backstretch were demolished to make way for 10 brick-and-masonry barns. Preakness purse reached \$195,200, the highest of Triple Crown races.

1971 – The 111-year-old Woodlawn Vase was appraised at \$500,000.

1973 – All-weather, glass-enclosed, trackside dining rooms called the Preakness Terrace, the Jockey Club Terrace and the Hall of Fame Dining Room were built on two floors of clubhouse at a cost of \$1.5 million. Ground space in front of clubhouse increased by 1,000 square feet. Secretariat won Preakness, on way to becoming first Triple Crown winner in 25 years.

1974 – Triple wagering began at Pimlico. Apprentice Chris McCarron rode 118 winners at Pimlico on way to world record 546 for the year.

1975 – Numerous parties sponsored by businessmen, civic and community groups commemorated the 100th Preakness won by Master Derby. Musician Eubie Blake, 92, was honored at Pimlico, the Baltimore-bred celebrity exercised horses at Pimlico at age 12 in 1895.

1976 – The Maryland Jockey Club, active during Colonial times, honored the 13 Original Colonies one by one on successive Saturdays in commemoration of nation’s Bicentennial Year.

1977 – Sixty-day meeting reduced to 38 days by labor strike which began at Bowie a week before Pimlico opened, causing Pimlico’s first 22 racing days to be canceled. ABC won Preakness TV contract. Seattle Slew became the 10th Triple Crown winner.

1978 – Opening day betting record of \$1,823,464 at Pimlico was set on March 18. Affirmed out dueled Alydar in all three classics to win the Triple Crown.

1980 – New TIM-300 American Totalisator Co. computerized betting machines installed. In the Preakness Codex beats the filly Genuine Risk, the Derby winner, surviving a claim of foul. The Codex-Genuine Risk controversy was settled at three-day Maryland Racing Commission hearing 19 days later.



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The Preakness result was not changed.

1981 – Simulcasting of Preakness offered for first time.

1982 – Freak weather, bitter cold, frozen track April 7 caused one-day cancellation of racing at Pimlico for first time since assassination of President John F. Kennedy. Pimlico press box dedicated to the memory of the late Red Smith.

1983 – Maryland Jockey Club buys Bowie Race Course, sells half-interest of property and racing dates to Laurel Race Course. The historic Woodlawn Vase is reappraised by Kirk Stieff Co. at \$1 million. Maryland-bred Deputed Testamony wins the Preakness in an upset.

1984 – New dining room on third floor of Pimlico's grandstand, named the Triple Crown Dining Room is constructed at a cost of \$500,000.

1985 – Installation of Reynolds aluminum inner turf course rail at a cost of \$150,000. Removal of the betting island on the first floor of the Pimlico clubhouse to allow more open area for the patrons. Tank's Prospect won the Preakness in 1:53 2/5, a record tied by Louis Quatorze in 1996.

1986 – On December 30, Frank De Francis, Robert and John "Tommy" Manfuso and Martin Jacobs purchased Pimlico from the Cohen families for more than \$30 million. Jorge Velasquez is voted into Jockey's Hall of Fame.

1987 – Pimlico's new owners immediately pumped over \$1 million into improvements. The 112th Preakness won by Derby victor Alysheba.

1988 – Another \$1.5 million was allocated by Pimlico's new owners for additional improvements. Completion of two modern barns topped the list. The Preakness Village, a corporate entertainment center located in the infield, was offered to local and regional firms for the first time. Preakness Celebrations Inc., a non profit corporation, was formed to organize a 10-day festival of social and recreational events leading up to the Preakness. Pimlico Special, with \$600,000 purse, revived by new management after a 29-year lull, was won by Bet Twice. Risen Star captures 113th Preakness.

1989 – Frank J. De Francis, Pimlico President and Chairman of the Board, dies August 18. His son, Joseph A. De Francis, an attorney, takes over the presidency of Pimlico and Laurel in September. Sunday Silence beats Easy Goer by a nose in a memorable race in the 114th Preakness. Blushing John, a 4-year-old colt owned by Allen E. Paulson, sets a track record of 1:53-1/5 in capturing the \$700,000 Pimlico Special. Pimlico introduces an ultra-modern Sports Palace. Jockey Kent Desormeaux wins 598 races (mostly in Maryland), surpassing Chris McCarron's 15-year record.

1990 – The Pimlico Special purse is increased to \$1 million, the richest race in history of Pimlico. Calumet Farm's 5-year-old Criminal Type wins the Pimlico

Special in 1:53, setting a track record for a mile and three-sixteenths.

1991 – In the sixth running of the Maryland Million on September 8 at Pimlico, a record Maryland Million crowd of 23,254 attends. The program includes a steeplechase stakes for the first time. It was only the third steeplechase run at Pimlico since the early 1950's.

1993 – The Maryland Jockey Club observes its 250th anniversary. Prairie Bayou wins 118th Preakness to provide Loblolly Stable with its second consecutive victory in this American classic. Crowd of 97,641 is the second largest in Preakness history. Cross-breed simulcasting between Thoroughbred and harness tracks begins on April 22. Full-card simulcasting from out-of-state tracks debuts on April 29. Maryland's first off-track betting site, the Cracked Claw Restaurant located near Frederick, MD, starts on April 30.

1994 – Maryland Jockey Club President Joseph A. De Francis bought out the ownership interests of Robert and John Manfuso. Under De Francis' leadership, the Maryland Jockey Club enjoys the most successful season of racing in the organization's 251-year history. Total in-state wagering reaches record \$461,602,755, eclipsing the previous mark of \$435,874,22 set in 1990.

1996 – Jockey Pat Day establishes a Preakness record by winning the classic for the third straight year with Louis Quatorze, who had finished 16th in the Kentucky Derby. Trainer Nick Zito saddles both the Preakness winner and Star Standard, victor in the Pimlico Special. For the first time since 1985, the Derby winner did not run in the Preakness. Grindstone was injured after his victory at Louisville.

1997 – The closest finish in the Preakness since the 1932 running found Kentucky Derby winner Silver Charm rallying to win by a head over Free House who finished a head in front of Captain Bodgit.

1998 – A record crowd of 91,122 jammed Pimlico to see Real Quiet win the 123rd Preakness. Bob Baffert became the first trainer to capture the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness Stakes in consecutive years. Total Preakness Day Handle reached \$37,591,459. Skip Away won the \$750,000 Pimlico Special on route to "Horse of the Year" honors.

2000 – Owner Frank Stronach and trainer Joe Orseno won both the Pimlico Special (Golden Missile) and The Preakness Stakes (Red Bullet). Richter Scale sets a track record 1:07.4 in the GR I De Francis Dash. The Maryland Jockey Club's production "The Preakness: An American Classic" won a prestigious Eclipse Award in the category of Local Television.

2001 – A record 104,454 packed historic Pimlico Race Course on the third Saturday in May to watch Point Given defeat 10 of the finest three-year olds in the 126th running of the Preakness, the middle jewel of Thoroughbred racing's Visa Triple Crown.



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Another 14,472 patrons watched from Laurel Park and Rosecroft, making the total attendance 118,926, another record. The previous records occurred in 1999 when 100,311 watched at Pimlico with a total statewide attendance of 116,526.

2002 – The second largest crowd in Preakness history, 101,138, packed Pimlico to watch 13 three-year olds in the middle jewel of Thoroughbred racing's Visa Triple Crown. A Preakness Day record of 10,121 watched from Laurel Park, while another 5,796 were on hand at Rosecroft, making the total statewide attendance 117,055. Handle marks were also shattered as \$71,468,223 was wagered on Pimlico's 13-race card, an increase of more than 14% from the previous record of \$62.7 million in 2002. On the state's signature event, a record \$47,695,192 was wagered, a 17.2 percent increase over the \$40,694,884 bet in 2001. On July 15, The Maryland Jockey Club and Magna Entertainment Corp announced the creation of an alliance designed to raise the level of Maryland thoroughbred racing to new heights. Under the terms of the agreement, Magna Entertainment purchased a 51% equity and voting interest in The Maryland Jockey Club of Baltimore City, Inc., the owner of Pimlico Race Course and a 51% voting interest and a 58% equity interest on a fully diluted basis in Laurel Racing Association Limited Partnership, Inc., the owner of Laurel Park. Joseph and Karin De Francis will retain a 49% equity and voting interest in The Maryland Jockey Club of Baltimore City, Inc. and a 49% voting interest and a 42% equity interest on a fully diluted basis in Laurel Racing Assoc., Inc. with an option to acquire an additional 7% equity interest for a total of a 49% equity interest. The day-to-day management of the MJC will remain in the hands of Joseph De Francis and his management team while Maryland racing will benefit from becoming an important part of Magna Entertainment's expanding network of major North American racetracks.

2003 – The Preakness Stakes, which was run under Magna Entertainment Corp. management for the first time, was a major success as attendance topped 100,000 for the fourth time in five years and betting figures exceeded \$60 million for the third consecutive year. The fourth largest crowd in history (100,268) packed historic Pimlico on a cold and rainy May 17 to watch 10 of the finest three-year olds in the middle jewel of thoroughbred racing's Visa Triple Crown. Despite 15 fewer betting interests than last year's record-breaking year, wagering finished at \$64.6 million, including \$38.5 on the state's signature race. The two headline events at Laurel Park also produced record-setting handle figures this year. The overall handle on De Francis Dash Day (November 16) was \$6.5 million, the best number in the 14-year history of the event. Maryland Million Day (October 18) also

featured a record handle as \$6.6 million was wagered, eclipsing the previous record of \$6.1 million set in 1999. The handle was the largest in the 92-year history of Laurel.

2004 – The 129th Preakness Stakes was a major success as records were set in attendance and handle. A crowd of 112,668 packed historic Pimlico Race Course, while wagering finished at \$87.9 million including \$59.4 million on the state's signature event. NBC Sports' broadcast of Smarty Jones' record breaking 11 1/2 -length victory in the middle jewel of the Visa Triple Crown delivered a 7.7 national rating/19 share for the race segment (5:45-6:50 p.m. ET), best since 1990 and a 35 percent improvement from 2003. The Maryland Jockey Club had productive cards on Maryland Million and De Francis Dash days. The \$4.6 million bet on the October 9 Pimlico card was a record for Maryland Million races, while a total of \$3.8 million passed through the pari-mutuel windows on the 10-race Fall Festival Of Racing card at Old Hilltop on November 20, a day featuring six added money races, headlined by the Grade I De Francis Dash. The field attracted four Breeders' Cup Sprint participants and the top three finishers from 2003. Seven of the top nine riders in the country based on earning had mounts in the main event.

2005 – A crowd of 115,318 packed historic Pimlico Race Course on May 21. Attendance figures have now topped six-figures in six of the last seven years on Preakness Day, including five straight. Preakness day wagering finished at more than \$91 million, breaking the record of nearly \$88 million set in 2004. A pool of \$63.2 million was bet on the middle jewel of the Triple Crown. The two headline events of the fall calendar at Laurel Park also set records. The \$5.1 million bet on the October 15 card was a record for Maryland Million races, while a total of \$4.8 million passed through the pari-mutuel windows on the November 19 Fall Festival Of Racing program, a day featuring eight added money races, headlined by the Grade I De Francis Dash. Numbers for the 2005 Laurel Park fall meeting were up nearly 30%. A major reason for the increase was the success of the new Laurel Park turf course, which debuted on September 7. The new, sweeping turf course, which was widened from 75 feet to 142 feet, helped make the track a top simulcast signal with an average of 11.2 starters per grass race as the export numbers were up more than 60% from last fall. The statistics were impressive as 105-of-134 races featured double digit fields, a 78% rate. Laurel Park's new turf course saw 29 full fields of 14 facing the starter. Only 11 races featured fewer than eight starters and nine of those were seven horse fields.

2006 – The marquee event of the year, the Preakness, was a material triumph as a record crowd of 118,402 swarmed Pimlico on May 20. Attendance



figures have now topped six-figures in seven of the last eight years, including six straight. Preakness day wagering finished at more than \$87.5 million, the third largest in the 131-year history of the event. A pool of \$56.4 million was bet on the middle jewel of the Triple Crown. The two headline events of the fall calendar were extremely successful. More than \$5.5 passed through the pari-mutuel windows on the November 25 Fall Festival Of Racing program, a day featuring eight added money races, headlined by the Grade I De Francis Dash. The \$4.9 million bet on the October 14 Maryland Million card was the second highest figure in the 21-year history of the event.

2007 – A record crowd of 121,263 packed Pimlico on Preakness day, the largest crowd to witness a sporting event in the state. Attendance figures have now topped six-figures in eight of the last nine years, including seven straight. Preakness day wagering finished at more than \$87.2 million, the fourth largest in the 132-year history of the event, with over \$57 million bet on the middle jewel of the Triple Crown. The 22nd annual Maryland Million event drew a record crowd of 26,788 to Laurel Park on a picture perfect October afternoon. Handle figures on the live card neared \$6 million with a record \$5,985,793 on the 12-race Laurel card shattering the record of \$5 million set in 2005. In September, Magna Entertainment Corp. exercised its option to acquire the remaining interest in The Maryland Jockey Club from Joseph De Francis and Karin De Francis.

2008 – At odds of 1-5, Big Brown becomes the shortest-priced Preakness winner since 1979 when Maryland-based Spectacular Bid won at 1-10. Trained by Maryland native Ricky Dutrow and ridden by Kent Desormeaux, who starred at Pimlico and Laurel Park in the late 1980's, the son of Boundary failed to become the first three-year-old to capture the Triple Crown in 30 years when he finished ninth in the Belmont Stakes.

2009 – The Maryland Jockey Club redefined the Infield experience on Preakness day, with InfieldFEST featuring a concert with three rock performances, including Rock and Roll Hall of Famers ZZ Top. Rachel Alexandra becomes the first filly in 85 years to win the Preakness, beating 12 boys, including Kentucky Derby winner Mine That Bird. The race drew 10.9-million viewers on NBC Sports, up 38% from 2008 when 7.9-million viewers watched Big Brown dominate the middle jewel of racing's Triple Crown against a field of overmatched runners. The race portion of the 2009 Preakness (5:56-6:50 p.m. ET) registered a national rating of 6.8, with a 16 share, the highest numbers since Smarty Jones five years earlier.

2010 – Pimlico Race Course teams up with Susan G. Komen for the Cure®, the world's largest breast cancer organization, to raise funds to aid awareness and research on Black-Eyed Susan Day. The People's

Pink Party included the Lady Legends For the Cure Race™, the first ever pari-mutuel race showcasing retired female riders, two of whom were breast cancer survivors. Profiled on NBC Sports, the race was also filmed as the climatic ending to the feature length documentary in production, JOCK, chronicling the story of the first generation of lady jockeys. Gwen Jocson won the inaugural race aboard Honor in Peace for her 764th career victory. Preakness attendance was up nearly 10% at Pimlico as the Preakness crowd increased from 77,850 to 95,760. Performances by Grammy Award winner Zac Brown Band and Platinum selling musical group O.A.R. in the infield contributed to a festive event. Hall of Fame trainer Bob Baffert won the Woodlawn Vase for the fifth time when Lookin At Lucky captured the middle jewel of racing's Triple Crown.

2011—After pressing a fast early pace, Michael Lauffer and W.D. Cubbedge's Shackleford took the lead into the homestretch and had just enough energy in reserve to hold off a charging Kentucky Derby winner Animal Kingdom by a half-length to capture the 2011 Preakness Stakes (G1) last May. The 136th running of the middle jewel of the Triple Crown was a fitting conclusion to a 13-race program that attracted 107,398 to Pimlico Race Course and generated an all-sources handle of \$76,376,689. The attendance, which included InfieldFest partygoers who were treated to concerts by Grammy Award winners Train and Bruno Mars, was the sixth largest in Preakness history. Trained by Dale Romans, Shackleford took down the \$600,000 winner's purse, as well a bonus of \$550,000, courtesy of the Preakness 5.5, an incentive program inaugurated by MI Developments and connected to his participation in the major 3-year-old stakes at Pimlico's sister track, Gulfstream Park. "I've won some big races, but none as exciting as that one," Romans said. "We had a great week here at Pimlico, and I'd just like to thank everybody here for the way they treated us."

2012—I'll Have Another moved one step closer to a Triple Crown sweep on May 19 at Pimlico Race Course with a thrilling narrow victory over a tenacious Bodemeister in the 137th running of the Preakness Stakes (G1). Reddam Racing LLC's 3-year-old colt, who defeated Bodemeister by 1 ½ lengths to win the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs two weeks earlier, was pushed to the limit to prevail by a neck over the Bob Baffert-trained pacesetter in the Middle Jewel of the Triple Crown. The exciting rematch was witnessed by a record crowd of 121,309 at Pimlico. The attendance, which included InfieldFest partygoers who were treated to concerts by six bands, featured headliners Maroon 5 and Wiz Khalifa, as well as a National Volleyball League tournament with Olympic gold medalists Phil Dalhausser and Todd Rogers. The 13-race thoroughbred card



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generated an all-sources handle of \$80,463,005. "The numbers say it all. We had a tremendous event," Maryland Jockey Club president Tom Chuckas said. "We knew in 2009 when we changed the landscape of the infield it would take three or four years to get to where we needed to get, and we are back. The crowd out there now is in the 21-35 group. They're here to have a good time, not to cause mayhem. First-rate entertainment and world class racing is a winning combination." In December, the Maryland Jockey Club, the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association and the Maryland Horse Breeders Association announced a 10-year agreement for sustained racing at Pimlico Race Course and Laurel Park. The 2013 racing season will feature 146 days of live racing days at the major Maryland tracks, the same number as in 2010, 2011 and 2012. The Maryland Jockey Club will guarantee a minimum of 100 days a year for the balance of the agreement. There are provisions in the contract for the horsemen to race additional days through a revenue-sharing program.

2013—Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas made history at Pimlico Race Course on May 18 when he saddled Oxbow for a front-running upset victory in the 138th Preakness Stakes (G1). The 15-1 long shot gave his 77-year-old trainer his sixth Preakness victory. Oxbow was in control throughout on his way to victory by 1 ¾ lengths under Hall of Fame jockey Gary Stevens. Kentucky Derby winner Orb, the 3-5 betting favorite, finished nine lengths behind the winner. Oxbow, who finished sixth in the Kentucky Derby, joined the Lukas-trained Codex (1980), Tank's Prospect (1985), Tabasco Cat (1994), Timber Country (1995) and Charismatic (1999) as a Preakness champion. Oxbow's triumph also created history for Stevens, who became the oldest jockey, at 50, to ride a Preakness winner. Eldon Nelson was 45 when he rode Bee Bee Bee to an upset victory in 1972. A crowd of 117,203 flocked into Pimlico, the fourth highest mark in the history of the event. The day included the fifth annual InfieldFest which featured concerts by six bands, including headliners Pitbull and Macklemore & Ryan Lewis. The 13-race card generated an all-sources handle of \$81,940,233. The handle ranked as the sixth best for Maryland's signature day.

2014—California Chrome continued on his quest for a Triple Crown sweep by scoring a dominating victory in the \$1.5 million Preakness Stakes (G1) to the enthusiastic approval of a record crowd of 123,469. Two weeks after capturing the Kentucky Derby (G1) by 1 ¾ lengths, the California-bred 3-year-old colt received yet another heads-up ride from jockey Victor Espinoza on his way to a 1 ½-length triumph over Ride On Curlin. The Preakness highlighted a 13-race program with nine stakes, including four graded stakes, generating an all-sources handle of \$83,786,363. The celebration

included performances by Grammy Award winner Lorde and hip-hop icon Nas in the infield.

2015—American Pharoah's victory in the Preakness Stakes under jockey Victor Espinoza was one of the more memorable moments in Triple Crown history. Under a dark sky and driving rain – and with a record Preakness crowd of 131,680 looking on – the Kentucky Derby, winner also won the Preakness over a sloppy track by seven lengths. Three weeks later he would win the Belmont Stakes and become racing's first Triple Crown winner in 37 years. The record crowd wagered \$85.16 million on the 14-race Preakness program, which included seven other stakes. Wagering was up 1.64 percent over the previous year. The wagering total was the sixth highest in Preakness history. American Pharoah's victory was the highlight of another outstanding week of racing and entertainment during Preakness Week at Pimlico. Along with Black-Eyed Susan Day, featuring the Ultimate Girls Day Out, InfieldFest featured a variety of eclectic acts including headliner and world-renowned trance producer and DJ Armin van Buuren.

2016 – A record crowd of 135,256 fans witnessed Exaggerator win the 141st Preakness Stakes over a sloppy track and under cloudy skies. It was a memorable victory for trainer Keith Desormeaux and his brother, jockey Kent Desormeaux. The record crowd on Preakness Day wagered a record \$94,127,434. The day before the Preakness, another record crowd of 47,956 watched Go Maggie Go win the Black-Eyed Susan. The weekend featured a number of eclectic music acts with the Preakness Day headliner at InfieldFest being The Chainsmokers.

2017 – Fans turned out in record numbers yet again for the 142nd Preakness as 140,237 were on hand to see Cloud Computing's thrilling victory over Classic Empire, the juvenile male champion of 2016, giving Hall of Fame jockey Javier Castellano his second career Triple Crown race victory – both in the Preakness – and trainer Chad Brown his first. The record crowd also established a new wagering record of \$97,168,658. Attendance and handle records were also broken a day prior to the Preakness as 50,339 watched Actress deliver a winning performance in the Black-Eyed Susan, with the day producing a total handle of \$19,885 million. Preakness InfieldFest was once again a success thanks to headliners Sam Hunt and Zedd.

2018 – For the second time in four years, fans were treated to the sight of a Triple Crown winner when Justify captured the 143rd Preakness Stakes before a crowd of 134,487, the third-largest in race history. Hall of Famer Bob Baffert made history by winning the Preakness for a seventh time. Total handle Preakness Day reached \$93,655,128, also ranking third overall. Despite rain showers, a sloppy track and dense fog, an energetic crowd was treated to 14 races, world-



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class dining, and entertainment featuring Preakness InfieldFest headliners Post Malone, 21 Savage and ODESZA. Fans were not deterred the previous afternoon on Black-Eyed Susan Day, which attracted a crowd of 48,625, the second-largest in the event's 94-year history. Total handle was \$18.591 million.

2019 – Gary and Mary West's War of Will provided a thrill for his owner, Canadian Hall of Fame trainer Mark Casse and Eclipse Award-winning jockey Tyler Gaffalione, providing all three with their first Triple Crown race triumph in the 144th Preakness Stakes. A crowd of 131,256 was on hand for the race, which generated an all-time Preakness Day total handle record of \$99,852,653, surpassing the previous mark of \$97,168,658 from 2017. Records also fell the previous afternoon on Black-Eyed Susan Day with a crowd of 51,573 and handle of \$22.281 million, topping the old standards of 50,339 and \$19.895 million, again from 2017. Three-time Grammy-nominated rapper Logic and DJs Diplo and Kygo headlined the annual InfieldFest celebration.

2020 – Swiss Skydiver made history by becoming just the sixth filly in history, second in nearly a century and first since Hall of Famer Rachel Alexandra in 2009 to beat the boys in the 145th Preakness Stakes. Ridden by Robby Albarado for trainer Ken McPeck and owner Peter Callahan, Swiss Skydiver prevailed from an epic stretch duel with Kentucky Derby and eventual Breeders' Cup Classic winner Authentic to complete 1 3/16 miles in 1:53.28, the second-fastest Preakness ever, trailing only 1973 Triple Crown winner Secretariat. The Preakness was held in October due to a coronavirus pandemic that paused live racing in the state for 2 ½ months from mid-March to late May, and restructured to be the final jewel in the Triple Crown. The Black-Eyed Susan, traditionally held on Preakness eve, was moved to be part of the Preakness Day program.

2021 – Bred and owned by John and Diane Fradkin, Rombauer's victory in the 146th Preakness Stakes provided his connections – including trainer Michael McCarthy – a win with their very first starter in a Triple Crown race. The Middle Jewel returned to its traditional mid-May spot on the calendar after being pushed back to October in 2020 amid the coronavirus pandemic. Rombauer earned his Preakness spot by virtue of his earlier win in the El Camino Real Derby at Golden Gate, and posted an 11-1 upset under Flavien Prat as Kentucky Derby first-place finisher and race favorite Medina Spirit ran third. With pandemic protocols still in place, fans were welcomed back with attendance capped at 10,000. The total handle of \$112,504,509 shattered the previous record of \$99,852,653 set in 2019. The Black-Eyed Susan was back in its familiar place on Preakness Eve, won by Mike Maker-trained Army Wife.

2022 – Baltimore native Seth Klarman of Klaravich Stables celebrated his 65th birthday in style when Early Voting sprung a 1 ¼-length upset of favored Kentucky Derby runner-up Epicenter in the 147th Preakness Stakes. It was the second time in six years Klarman and trainer Chad Brown teamed up to win the Middle Jewel of the Triple Crown with a late-developing horse, opting to skip the Derby with an eligible horse and point to Old Hilltop. Headlined by popular music and recording artists Chainsmokers, Marshmello, Frank Walker and Moneybagg Yo, InfieldFest returned in full force after missing the two previous years due to pandemic restrictions. Attendance topped 60,000 and all-sources handle was \$104 million. One day prior, Interstatedaydream got a smooth ride to win the 98th Black-Eyed Susan.

2023 – National Treasure's front-running head triumph over Blazing Sevens in the 148th Preakness was the record-breaking eighth for trainer Bob Baffert in the Middle Jewel of the Triple Crown and the first for fellow Hall of Famer, jockey John Velazquez. Bruno Mars returned as the headliner for InfieldFest 2023, part of a packed lineup that included Sofi Tukker, Zack Bia, Chantel Jeffries, Martin 2 Smoove and DJ Quicksilva. On Preakness Eve, Taxed came with a late run on the outside to capture the 99th Black-Eyed Susan.

HISTORY OF PIMLICO RACE COURSE

Historic Pimlico Race Course, home of the Preakness Stakes, first opened its doors on October 25, 1870, making it the second oldest racetrack in the nation behind Saratoga, which debuted in 1864 in upstate New York. Engineered by General John Ellicott, Pimlico has played host to racing icons for over a century, where Baltimoreans have seen the likes of legendary horses such as Man o' War, Sir Barton, Seabiscuit, War Admiral, Citation, Secretariat and Cigar thunder down the stretch in thrilling and memorable competition.

Constructed on 70 acres west of the Jones Falls, the Maryland Jockey Club purchased the land for \$23,500, and built the racetrack for \$25,000 after Maryland's Governor at the time, Oden Bowie, suggested the interesting proposition during a dinner party in Saratoga, New York in 1868. Bowie and his friends, prominent racing figures, had agreed to run a race in two years commemorating the evening, for horses that were yearlings at the time. The winner would have to host the losers for dinner. Both Saratoga and the American Jockey Club made bids for the event, but Governor Bowie pledged he would build a model racetrack in his home state if the race were to be run in Baltimore. Thus, Pimlico was built.

"Pimlico" was the name given the area by English settlers in Colonial times, although the "Pemblicoe" spelling appeared on the original settlement charter granted to a group of Englishmen in 1669. The colonists hailed from an area near London, and harbored memories of a famous landmark "Olde Ben Pimlico's Tavern."

On a typical race day in the 1800's, Baltimoreans in all sorts of horse-drawn carriages paraded out through Druid Hill Park, then by Green Spring Road to the Course. Afterwards, in the early days, a spur was built from the Western Maryland Railroad at Arlington direct to the grandstand, for convenience.

The racetrack soon became affectionately known as "Old Hilltop," after a small rise in the infield that became a favorite gathering place for trainers and race enthusiasts to view the contestants close-up, and vigorously cheer on their favorites. The infield was always a fashionable rendezvous, where in days gone by the four-in-hands, "spikes," tandems, pairs and singles were parked and lively guests congregated between the races for a champagne lunch. This custom continues today in the Corporate Village at Preakness, where over 5,000 people representing many major corporations in the Mid-Atlantic region gather in a 21st century version of yesteryear's "garden party." Over 60,000 revelers crowd additional areas of the infield to celebrate Preakness Day.

Regrettably, though the famous moniker remains today, the notable infield "hill" was removed in April 1938,

ostensibly for obscuring track-level vision of the racetrack backstretch, which appeared to pose a problem for movie and television cameras in the infant days of filming races.

Despite a brief hiatus from flat racing between 1889 and 1904 – when the Preakness and Dixie were run at other tracks, and "outlaw" race meets sprung up around Maryland – Pimlico has conducted racing each year since its revival in 1904. During this interim period, steeplechase enthusiasts kept racing alive, and even became Maryland Jockey Club members upon Pimlico's re-emergence. In 1904, racing at Pimlico ignited unprecedented recognition and interest from the public and newspapers alike. Race charts appeared, quite similar to modern-day style, and for the first time Baltimore readers found the news accounts more than mere social reports.

Racing in Pimlico even survived a 1910 anti-gambling movement that swept the country, prohibiting the sport everywhere, except in Maryland and Kentucky. Colonel Matt Winn of Churchill Downs is alleged to have credited Pimlico's Billy Riggs as the savior of eastern racing at this time. It was Riggs' use of the less-sinful "French Pools," or pari-mutuel machines, in 1913 as opposed to the controversial bookmakers and their blackboards, that preserved racing at Pimlico during this turbulent time in racing. A new era was born at Pimlico, which later became the first racetrack in the country to utilize an electric starting gate.

Pimlico today welcomes racegoers arriving by car, limousine, and even helicopter, as graciously as those who visited when "Old Hilltop" was reached primarily by horse-drawn vehicle, over 130 years ago. During its rich history, the racetrack has enjoyed being the only track in the United States to be honored by the adjournment of the U.S. House of Representatives for the first and only time in history in 1877 to watch a race between Parole, Ten Broeck and Tom Ochiltree. The race became known as "The Great Race," and a reproduction of its finish is immortalized as a Pimlico trademark, adorning the clubhouse as a signal to all entering that Pimlico is a place where legends will endure forever.

En route to becoming a true national treasure, Pimlico has earned its patina of age, weathering small and major wars, recessions, depressions – including the Great Depression of the 1930's – fires, storms . . . and the simple passage of time. Its vitality has spanned many an era, representing a time and a society now involving three centuries. More than 50 years ago, the youthful president of the Maryland Jockey Club, Alfred G. Vanderbilt, made a pertinent observation that remains today, as Pimlico moves into another century: "Pimlico is more than a dirt track bounded by four streets. It is an accepted American institution, devoted to the best interests of a great sport, graced by time, respected for its honorable past."

HISTORY OF LAUREL PARK

Laurel Park first appeared on the racing scene on October 2, 1911. Its first meeting was held under the direction of the Laurel Four County Fair. Three years later, in 1914, New York City grocery entrepreneur James Butler purchased the track, installing renowned promotions king Col. Matt Winn as the track's general manager. Winn is recognized as the man who put the Kentucky Derby on the racing map.

Under Butler's stewardship, Laurel hosted three match races, beginning with Hourless vs. Omar Khayyam at one mile and one-quarter on October 18, 1917. Hourless had won the 1917 Belmont Stakes and Omar Khayyam had accounted for the Kentucky Derby that year. When the two horses met in the Brooklyn Derby earlier that year, Omar Khayyam prevailed by a nose, but in the Laurel match race Hourless rallied to win by a length in a time of 2:02.

The next year, top two-year-olds Billy Kelly and Eternal met in a six-furlong match race at Laurel, vying for a \$20,000 pot. Eternal edged Billy Kelly by a head, and winning owner J. W. McClelland donated his purse money to the Red Cross. Then, on October 26, 1923, two-year-olds met again in a match race when Sarazin defeated Happy Thoughts at six furlongs.

In 1947, the Maryland Jockey Club, owners of Pimlico and Timonium at the time, purchased Laurel from the Butler estate with the idea of shifting the Pimlico meeting to Laurel. However, when the plan was not approved by the Maryland Legislature, the Maryland Jockey Club decided to sell the track to Baltimore industrialist Morris Schapiro, who appointed his youngest son John David Schapiro as the track's new president. Laurel was sold to the Schapiros in 1950.

John D. Schapiro began revitalizing Laurel soon thereafter. He changed the track's name to Laurel Race Course and introduced the Washington, D.C. International, a race designed to bring together the world's best at one mile

and one-half on the grass. England's Wilwyn rallied from off the pace to win in the inaugural running of the International in 1952. The race went on to become an important fixture on United States and foreign racing calendars before being placed on hiatus in 1995.

In 1953 Laurel opened a new clubhouse and turf club, and in 1957 the grandstand was remodeled. In an effort to improve conditions for the International, Laurel lengthened its turf course from seven furlongs to one mile in 1959; simultaneously, the main track was extended from one mile to one mile and one-eighth.

Laurel remodeled its clubhouse and grandstand to accommodate winter racing in 1966, enclosing the track's seating area with 30,000 square feet of half inch thick glass. Conversely, when Laurel was awarded the summer racing dates in 1982, the track installed an air conditioning system in the grandstand and clubhouse. In 1984, the 34-year Schapiro era ended with the sale of the track.

Renaissance at Laurel

Laurel entered a new era in December 1984, when Frank J. De Francis and his partners, Robert and John "Tommy" Manfuso, purchased the racetrack from Schapiro.

An innovative Laurel project was the creation of the Sports Palace in 1985. It was the first of its kind in the horse racing world. The glittering \$2 million facility was a bold innovation that combines the ambience of a plush casino with state-of-the-art technology which featured computerized handicapping and a video racing library. The concept of the Sports Palace has been widely copied by other tracks.

In 1986, another \$1 million was spent on additional improvements. The first floor of the clubhouse was

totally renovated. The club bar and concession stands were enhanced with black marble, brass and neon accents. Three dining rooms were also part of the improvements, including the first floor "Silks Room" with its mahogany panelling and stained glass windows, where light fare is offered. The "Ruffian Room," located on the mezzanine level, is reserved for special events, and the "Sky Suite Club," for members, have also been completely redesigned in a most elegant fashion, making them among the finest at any racetrack in America.

In 1987, another \$1 million

was allocated to improvements, which centered on beautifying and modernizing the second floor of the clubhouse. Two new cinema theaters were added, one on the clubhouse second level and the other on the grandstand mezzanine. Important sporting events are televised in each theater.

Exterior improvements included repaving of the track apron, parking lots and stable area. Extensive landscaping has been completed around the track grounds, particularly in the paddock area with a new entrance and attractive white fencing. Also erected was a new barn in the International Village to accommodate foreign horses for the Turf Festival.

Inter-track wagering made its debut at Laurel in early 1988 with the Sports Palace playing a major role in attracting fans to the satellite-beamed races. Laurel fan support of Pimlico racing has continued to increase.

In August 1989, Frank J. De Francis died, but his vision lived on through his son, Joseph A. De Francis, serving as president of Laurel and Pimlico. Following in the footsteps of his father, De Francis introduced several concepts to Maryland racing. Under the younger De Francis' control, Off-Track Wagering, full-card simulcasting and a renewed commitment to the patron have combined to rejuvenate the sport.

In October of 1994, Joe De Francis announced that the storied racing oval would return to its roots; the track was officially renamed Laurel Park. In addition, an aggressive, multi-million dollar renovation project was unveiled and a new department—Public Relations, under the direction of Karin De Francis—was created to focus on customer service.

Following his purchase of the ownership interests of Robert and John A. Manfuso, Jr., Joe De Francis guided the track to its most successful year ever in 1994 and topped the total betting handle record in 1995.

In 1997 major improvements were made to Laurel's main entrance, the Grandstand interior and to backstretch barns. The new Main Line-1 features quadruple, large-screen TV theaters with desks and wireless mutuel terminals for the serious racing fans.

Another major improvement at Laurel was the complete rebuilding of the nine furlong racing strip in 1998. It was a massive undertaking, directed by John Passero, costing almost \$2 million.

In 1999, at Laurel Park, the MJC broke ground on a new \$1.85 million backstretch housing project, Laurel Commons, in cooperation with Laurel Quality of Life, Inc., the Enterprise Foundation, Inc. and the Ryan Family Foundation, Inc. In addition, Laurel Park, as part of a \$16 million multi-year renovation plan, opened four premier Clubhouse areas: "Tycoons," an upscale cigar and brandy bar; "Sunny Jim's," a simulcast theatre with individual carrels; "Clocker's Corner," a casual simulcast theatre and cafe in a convenient track-side location and the "Kelso Club," a premier accommodation for VIP

customers with concierge service.

The backstretch and racing surfaces at Laurel Park were closed from mid-June 2004 to early January 2005 as Magna Entertainment Corp. began a multi-million dollar renovation, which included the widening of both racing surfaces. The new main course, which has been raised and increased in width from 75 to 95 feet, now features one-turn mile races. The track's composition of 89 percent sand and 11 percent silt and clay is identical to the old Laurel dirt surface. The new, sweeping turf course, which was widened from 75 feet to 142 feet, helped make the track a top simulcast signal. The turf accommodates six track configurations which were named All Along, Bowl Game, Kelso, Dahlia, Exceller and Fort Marcy, in honor of some of the great horses which have competed on the grass at Laurel Park.

Beginning in 2015, Laurel underwent the most significant renovations to its front side and backstretch in more than two decades. More than \$20 million was invested to renovate and reinvigorate the facility and its product. Laurel also made admission and general parking free to all fans.

Laurel's first floor witnessed a total makeover with a new state-of-the-art simulcast room, more than 150 flat-screen televisions, hardwood floors, new furniture and a new Flying Dog bar. The Terrace Dining Room and bar were renovated and work began on restoring the Ruffian Room.

Laurel's races were broadcast and simulcast in high definition and a new surveillance system was installed on the front and backside of the track. Laurel also began work on its backside by completing new, state-of-the-art barns that each included 150 stalls, laundry rooms, restrooms, locker rooms and wash pads.

On track, the 30th anniversary of the Jim McKay Maryland Million witnessed a 37-percent increase in handle over 2014 and the crowd of 19,119 marked a 1,000-plus increase over the previous year. The Commonwealth Derby, Oaks and Turf Cup were presented for the first time at Laurel in 2015 by the Virginia Equine Alliance.

In 2016, the Maryland Jockey Club continued renovating Laurel Park and reinvigorating racing. The 2016 Maryland Million attracted a crowd of 21,722 that wagered \$4.476 million, a 59 percent increase over the 2014 handle. More turf racing continued to be carded over Laurel's world-class turf course. Handle on Laurel's 2017 Winter Carnival, featuring the Barbara Fritchie and General George, was \$4.928 million, nearly a \$2 million increase over 2016. The Maryland Jockey Club continued its \$30 million renovation of the facility with new suites, event rooms and a new Director's Room. The Maryland Jockey Club also moved forward with innovative programs including Fantasy Owner's Day and Fantasy Football.



LAUREL PARK 100

Laurel Park first appeared on the racing scene on October 2, 1911. Its first meeting was held under the direction of the Laurel Four County Fair. Three years later, in 1914, New York City grocery entrepreneur James Butler purchased the track, installing renowned promotions king Col. Matt Winn as the track's general manager. Winn is recognized as the man who put the Kentucky Derby on the racing map.

"It has been a fantastic day," said Maryland Jockey Club president Tom Chuckas, on the 100th anniversary event in October 2011. "It is an opportunity to thank Laurel and the surrounding communities for 100 years of support. I think we have been a good corporate citizen and corporate partner. We are lucky to have Laurel and the community is lucky to have us."

The Maryland Jockey Club donated \$2,700 to two area elementary schools with a modified jockey challenge program that took place during the first four races on the card. Ryan Fogelsonger had a win aboard Our Bailiwick in the opener and finished second with Funny Side Girl to help Brock Bridge Elementary School earn \$1,700 and win the challenge.

"The schools can always use the money to help the kids learn," said Fogelsonger, who visited Brock Bridge two days before the event and talked to all 700 students. "It was a lot of fun. They all seemed excited about coming out today."

Highlights from the first 100 years of racing at Laurel Park:

- Triple Crown winners Sir Barton, War Admiral, Whirlaway, Secretariat and Affirmed won races at Laurel Park during their Hall of Fame careers.
- Classic winners Omar Khayyam (1917 Kentucky Derby), Hourless (1917 Belmont Stakes), Exterminator (1919 Kentucky Derby), High Echelon (1970 Belmont), Riva Ridge (1972 Derby & Belmont), Spectacular Bid (1979 Derby & Preakness Stakes), Bet Twice (1987 Belmont), Go and Go (1990 Belmont) and Barbaro (2006 Derby) also competed at the central Maryland track.
- Seabiscuit prepped at Laurel Park for his famous

match race with War Admiral. On October 15, 1938, two weeks before the Pimlico Special, Seabiscuit finished second in the Laurel Stakes, a race he had won the previous year.

- Kelso, the only five-time Horse of the Year, won the 1964 Washington D.C. International in his fourth attempt, beating rival Gun Bow. Kelso finished second in his three previous tries in the International, all by less than a length.
- Sandy Hawley became the first rider in history with 500 victories in a single-season when he guided Charlie Jr. to victory at Laurel Park on December 15, 1973. Hawley finished the year with 515 victories.
- Chris McCarron surpassed Hawley with his 516th winner on December 17, 1974 aboard Oh My Love at Laurel Park. He completed the year with 546 victories.
- Kent Desormeaux broke McCarron's mark when he rode his 547th winner for the year, aboard Gilten, at Laurel on November 30, 1989. Desormeaux finished the year with 598 victories, a record that still stands.
- The Maryland Million, an innovative program devised by broadcaster Jim McKay to promote the Maryland breeding industry, debuted at Laurel Park in 1986. The 26th running of the event took place at Laurel on October 1, 2011.
- Edgar Prado became the fourth jockey to win 500 races in a single-season when he reached the wire first aboard Hardball on November 30, 1997 at Laurel Park. Prado ended the year with 536 victories.
- Mario Pino became the 15th rider in North America to reach 6,000 career wins when he guided Pass Play to victory at Laurel Park on November 7, 2007.
- Rapid Redux joined Zenyatta and Peppers Pride as the only horses in North American thoroughbred history to win 19 consecutive races in a row after he out stepped four starter allowance runners at Laurel Park on October 27, 2011

Chris McCarron (1974), Ronnie Franklin (1978), Alberto Delgado (1982), Allen Stacy (1986), Kent Desormeaux (1987), Mike Luzzi (1989), Mark Johnston (1990), Jeremy Rose (2001), Ryan Fogelsonger (2002), Victor Carrasco (2013), Weston Hamilton (2018), Alexander Crispin (2020) and Axel Concepcion (2023) have brought home the hardware for the state.



LOVING LAUREL

Jaime Rodriguez tied the record shared by Chuck Baltazar and Horacio Karamanos by riding seven winners from eight mounts at Laurel Park on March 17, 2023, including each of the first five races. After finishing second in the first race of the day, Baltazar rode seven straight winners on Dec. 15, 1969. Karamanos had four consecutive wins en route to his seven-win day on Oct. 26, 2022.

Bill Hartack won six races on Nov. 5, 1955, while fellow Hall of Famer Kent Desormeaux had a pair of six-win days in February 1989 (17 & 28) and Mario Pino was aboard six winners on Oct. 25, 2003.
